

Challenges on a Personal Level

Transitioning to a new country can bring a range of personal challenges. These are some of the most common issues faced by international athletic directors.

- 1. Homesickness and Missing Family/Friends
 - Leaving loved ones behind can be emotionally challenging, leading to feelings of homesickness and loneliness. (Trixie passing while we were in Canada technology has helped).
 - It's important to maintain regular communication with family and friends, and to find ways to stay connected with your home culture.
- 2. Adapting to a New Culture, Environment and Language
 - Adjusting to a new culture, environment, and language can be a complex and overwhelming process.
 - Be patient with yourself as you learn to navigate your new surroundings and adapt to different customs and traditions.
 - Seek out opportunities to immerse yourself in the local culture and learn the language.

 - It's important to be organized and detail-oriented to ensure that all logistical aspects of the event/competition run smoothly.

4. Language Barriers

- Communicating effectively with stakeholders who may speak different languages can be a challenge.
- This may involve learning some basic phrases in the local language, using translators, or finding other ways to communicate effectively.

5. Limited Resources

- International schools may have limited resources compared to US schools, including facilities, equipment, and funding.
- It's important to be creative and resourceful in managing these limitations.
- You may need to find alternative ways to provide athletic opportunities for your students."

- Working in an international school exposes you to a diverse range of cultures and perspectives.
- This can broaden your horizons, challenge your assumptions, and help you develop a greater understanding of the world.
 - a. Walked the Great Wall of China, looked a North Korean soldier in 'one' eye at the DMZ and spent an anniversary in the Maldives in a hut on the Ocean.
- 2. Opportunities for Global Travel and Exploration
 - International athletic directors often have the opportunity to travel to different countries for competitions, conferences, and professional development opportunities.
 - This allows you to explore new cultures, experience different ways of life, and create lasting memories.
- 3. Building International Networks and Connections
 - Working in an international setting allows you to build a network of professional contacts from all over the world.
 - These connections can be valuable resources for career advancement, collaboration, and personal support.
 - a. Chris is a friend for life my first memory of him is when he 'accidentally' subbed in a fouled out player during a Championship game against my school in a one point game (we won;-)
- 4. Enhanced Personal and Professional Development
 - Living and working abroad can be a transformative experience that helps you develop new skills, overcome challenges, and grow as a person.
 - You will learn to adapt to new environments, communicate effectively with people from different cultures, and manage complex situations.
- 5. Competitive Compensation and Benefits Packages
 - International schools often offer competitive compensation and benefits packages to attract and retain qualified athletic directors.
 - These packages may include housing allowances, health insurance, tuition reimbursement, and other benefits.
